#### PASTOR'S PONDERINGS: New Year's Resolutions!

Greetings of the new year to you! I pray that God's blessings find you throughout 2025! I know that God has been blessing me as I journey with you in faith. I've also felt God's presence with our church as we look to a future in the Conejo Valley. You may be the type to look at new year's resolutions each year. In that spirit

I've been reflecting on the ways that we can support the church in its journey forward. Maybe there's room for a resolution or two in this area?

Yes, I know that we often talk about support in terms of financial gifts. But we should also think in terms of time. As we reflect on our presence in worship, at events, and with commitments to social justice; we should see that these are gifts of time and energy that we offer to God through the church. It's just nice that this presence blesses us, too. So, with the new year at hand I thought I might map out some of the ways to live out our faith in ways that bless our church.

First of all, you may be thinking that the best ways to support the church are community based. I might argue that the more important support is personal. There's nothing wrong with a humble explanation of what has brought meaning and love to your life. Granted, we should recognize that not everyone is interested in our particular pathway to God. At the same time, not to share for fear of manipulating others has its cost, too. The key word here might be humility.

Again, I pray that you're looking with eager anticipation for the ways that God will engage us this year. Not only that, I hope that you're excited to share about all that God is already doing! Have a blessed 2025!





#### **January Mission Moment**

#### Casa Pacifica Transitional Youth Services

- In California, close to 31% of transitionage foster youth (ages 18-25) experience homelessness.
- One in five homeless youth is a human trafficking victim.
- Of the youth who age out of foster care, an estimated 25% will be involved in the justice system.

These are some awesome statistics! These young people often face daunting challenges as they strive for independence. Prolonged instability and a lack of strong family and community connections can leave many young people struggling to find their footing. The threat of homelessness and the fear of isolation, along with financial insecurity, can impact their ability to build a healthy future. Recognizing their unique needs, Casa Pacifica has expanded their programs to include stable housing and supportive services specifically tailored to aid in the journey to adulthood for transitional-age youth.

Your generosity is instrumental in making this possible. Casa Pacifica offers a newly refurbished place to live, access to education, employ-

ment training, mental health services and life skills development for these vulnerable youth so they will not be a burden on our community.

Casa Pacifica recently completed a 6-month renovation of three of its campus cottages to create 27 units specifically designed for at-risk young adults, ages 18-25, who have touched the foster care/probation system or are at high risk of homelessness. The new suites can accommodate both individuals and single parents and families. The fully furnished cottages feature nine bedrooms along with a shared kitchen, laundry and common area. Ask any of our congregants who attended the tour of these cottages in October about the warm and communal atmosphere that has been created there.

Each of the cottages' kitchens and common areas need to be outfitted with basic living essentials that will help the residents learn how to thrive in the community. Casa Pacifica believes it is important to create a clean, lovely, functional environment where youth can feel "at home." Help us fulfill this need. Casa Pacifica's TYS program is the vital step in the life of a young adult at-risk. Your generosity can help them succeed. They thank you for your consideration.

#### **Finance Corner**

Q. What is a Qualified Charitable Contribution (QCD)? Can I specify which UMCWV funds I would like my QCD to be allocated to?

A. A Qualified Charitable Contribution (QCD) is a distribution made from an Individual Retirement Arrangement (IRA) to an eligible charitable organization, such as UMCWV. The distribution must be made payable to the charity. If you receive your distribution check made payable to UMCWV before sending or giving the check to the UMCWV church office, you may wish to write in the memo section of the check all of the funds and amounts you wish your allocation to go to. For example, Operating Budget fund #101, Apportionments fund #112. You may also provide a note to the church office about your allocation wishes.

The QCD option is available regardless of whether an eligible IRA owner itemizes deductions on <u>Schedule</u> <u>A</u>. The distributions are not taxable, and no deduction for it may be taken.

Please check with your tax advisor or financial consultant to ensure that you meet the requirements for giving a OCD.
